# Mother Nature by Dave Wright

The high-water flows resulting from Hurricane Debbie on Friday and Saturday, August 9 and 10, pulled down both the upper and lower cables that set the boundaries for the fly project on Clear Shade Creek. One of the trees holding the lower cable was dead and decayed and pulled out completely, swinging to the opposite bank with the orange sheathing still attached. The upper cable snapped and the orange sheath was lost. On Tuesday, August 20th, MLTU members repaired and restored the cables to their original positions. The project took about three hours to complete. The restrung cables are high enough for kayakers to pass underneath safely. Thank you to the Windber Water Authority for opening the gates, allowing easy access to this area of Clear Shade Creek.

The high water from Hurricane Debbie did not adversely affect the recently completed work on Stewarts Run. All of the structures held in place. Some of the top-dressed soil did wash away, but all the rock and wood held fast.

Eric Null, adjunct instructor at Garrett College in Maryland, in partnership with the Somerset Conservation District, surveyed sections of Higgins Run, Coal Run, Shingle Run, and Dark Shade Creek for wild trout populations on Friday, August 16, 2024. This activity was open to the public and some MLTU members tagged along to observe.

Students from Eric's fisheries class, along with Greg Shustrick, the District's Watershed Specialist, and Adam Cotchen of the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, used electrofishing equipment to stun and capture the fish in nets so they could be counted and measured before being returned to the streams.

Higgins Run flows into the Quemahoning Reservoir and is in the process of a "chop and drop" large wood project to improve stream habitat. Several age classes of wild brown and a single rainbow trout were documented in Higgins Run. According to Somerset Conservation District Watershed Specialist Greg Shustrick, "The survey documented that there are more trout in the 2 to 3 year age class and the young of the year are larger than pre-habitat installation." There were 102 wild trout captured in the 100-meter section and that does not include those that escaped the survey. Shustrick adds, "We hope to see this documented trend continue in the coming years."

Coal Run and Shingle Run are located within State Game Lands 228 and join to form Dark Shade Creek. Coal Run did not produce any trout, although the limestone bed treatment system installed in Gahagen to improve the stream's pH was only completed earlier this year. Shingle Run and Dark Shade Creek did produce a few impressive and beautifully colored, 10-11-inch wild brook trout. In the upper portion of Dark Shade Creek, several wild brook trout were captured and others were seen escaping.

Shingle Run received limestone sand in 2008 and also had wild brook trout transferred to it in order to reestablish a wild trout population. The stream was resurveyed in 2009 and wild trout still survived; however, since that time, data has been lacking. Shustrick points out, "This stream is a candidate for large wood addition, but more monitoring, water chemistry, and macro data are needed. There is real potential for this waterway."

This survey documented that wild trout are indeed present in the Shade Creek watershed. More evaluation and data are required in order to determine how best to increase both the quality and quantity of wild trout in these waterways.

It was an enlightening and enjoyable day for all involved.
